## The Foster Clark Collection Works by Garth Tapper, Ray Crook & Others Lots 20 - 39

The Collection features eighteen works by Garth Tapper, the best examples of which are included in this catalogue. Remaining drawings by Tapper will be offered in our *Contemporary, Foreign & Collectable* art auction 20 November, along with further interesting works by associated artists.

Foster Clark, a successful artist and illustrator in his own right, first met tutor Garth Tapper during his time at Auckland's Elam School of Fine Arts. Tapper attended Elam from 1945 to 1951 and lectured in painting during his final year. Prior to Tapper's departure for Europe, where he studied at the Slade and Chelsea Schools of Art, the two artists formed a friendship which was to last a lifetime.

Foster Clark gained his Diploma of Fine Art and taught for two years in Auckland before founding a screenprinting company in the 1960s. During the 1970s he manufactured his own range of swimwear but went on to become a full time artist exhibiting in Cairns, Australia. It was here that he befriended fellow artist, Ray Crook. These days Foster resides in the Bay of Islands, travelling to Cairns each year to exhibit his screenprints and original works.

This collection contains two Tapper portraits of particular note, both painted in 1949. They were successfully submitted to the Carnegie Scholarship in 1952. This scholarship enabled the artist to travel and study in England during the early 1950s. A rare portrait of Anne Tapper, the artist's wife features along with the poignant last portrait, *Lorraine*, the Fish Girl completed shortly before Tapper's death in 1999.

Works by Ray Crook were acquired directly from the artist. Jan Nigro's Jane & Kelly and Emily Jackson's West Coast Landscape were purchased at auction from International Art Centre in the early 1990s.
